"Breath Prayers"

This past year I have had the pleasure of moderating four different church sessions. I have moderated the First Presbyterian Church of Vassar, the Fraser Presbyterian Church located north of Cass City, the First Presbyterian Church of Cass City, and our own church here at Taymouth. Each church and session have their individual dynamics and approaches how they perceive ministry and how they live out their mission. One thing in common with all the churches is their life in prayer. Prayer is a powerful thing. Prayer is very important in a church's and session's life. These past years I have supplemented each session's educational, training, or devotional event with readings and reflections from our denomination's ruling elders resource series entitled, "Regarding Ruling Elders: A Monthly Series for Serving Faithfully." These past years there have been some great gems of thought and insight. This month, February's reflection, deals with prayer. It simply states, "Leaders Pray."

I have always viewed every church member as a leader. Now some may think a person has to serve on session to be a leader, not so! A leader is a disciple of Jesus Christ. You and I are leaders by our very association as Jesus' chosen disciples serving the First Presbyterian Church of Taymouth. We are called to lead and fulfill God's mission in our community and in God's neighborhood called the world. To accomplish what God calls us to be and do we must first start with prayer. Prayer life is the essence of ministry, leadership, and discipleship.

There are many approaches to a fulfilled prayer life. My latest reading of the article, "Leaders Pray," stresses the importance of prayer through what we do on a daily basis and never stop doing—breathing. The simple act of breathing enables us to feel God's spirit, God's breath of life. In Biblical Hebrew the word "rah" means breath, life, wind, and/or spirit. The same word is used interchangeably throughout Scripture symbolizing God's presence in the very breath we breathe.

In ministry, from the beginning of life to the end of life, we may not be able to "see" air or wind or God's divine spirit, but we certainly can feel it against our skin and in our lungs. We can get a glimpse of the unseen "rah" when we observe nature like the leaves fluttering in the trees, or the field crops swaying back and forth in the fields. A "breath prayer" is breathing God's sacredness in and out of ourselves.

The Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka who wrote the article "Leaders Pray" states: "Then I was introduced to breath prayers—the idea that because God brought humankind to life by breathing into us (Genesis 2:7), when we breathe in, we take in God's very breath. And when we breathe out, we breathe God's breath to the creation. Breathing is a form of prayer because the goal is that we might be more attuned to God, and breathing takes God's very breath into our bodies."

I encourage you to pray breath prayers focusing on God's mercies for our and God's neighborhood—the world—during Lent. Lent is a time for deep spiritual reflection. Lent is a time for faith development. Lent is a time for disciple leadership. Lent is a time for disciples to breathe prayers.

The Presbyterian Foundation has selected Ten Scriptures for Stewardship to help all churches and encourage congregations through this time. The scriptures help us to reflect on stewardship, gener-

osity and gratitude. Each newsletter, we will highlight a new scripture.

Start at the very beginning! From Genesis 1:1-5 (The Creation Story), In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light." And there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day" and the darkness he called "night". And there was evening, and there was morning – the first day.

This verse reminds us that God created everything, so all that we have is ultimately from God. It is also a reminder that God brings Light into our world, and as children of the light, we are called to live lives of gratitude and generosity, giving back to the work of God out of the abundance that God
